ones.










2. SHARE: It's never too early to share that you are fostering kittens! Post pictures on your social media, bring pictures to work, send them in an email, send a group text – no one will say no when you ask, "Wanna see something cute?" Sharing pictures while you are just fostering is a low-pressure way to let friends, family and co-workers know about your kittens. There is no such thing as too many kitten pictures.



3. NAME: In order to get more shares on social media, try giving your kittens creative names. Cats named Fluffy, Sheba, and Whiskers are pretty common, so your kittens need to stand out! For example, a foster who loves themes once named a litter Fettucine, Alfredo, Spaghetti, and Meatball! It's going to get more attention online, which is best for your bunch.

4. BRAG: Your kittens need to stand out from the crowd! Is one kitten especially cuddly? Curious? Playful? All kittens are unique and adopters want to know why. When sharing info, remember to include details such as litter-trained, behavior around other pets, kids, etc. One benefit from adopting from a foster home is that the kittens are exposed to more than the shelter. So brag about it!

6. DOUBLE: Remind your adopters that two kittens are better than one! (This is where fun names come in handy – how can you adopt Spaghetti without Meatball?) Kittens keep each other entertained while you're at work and love growing up together. Most shelters will do BOGO deals and if you're a private foster, you can too!



#### A few reminders from fellow soldiers:

- Neo-natal kittens are fragile, so be sure to be upfront and honest with your adopters. If you have kittens who are under 6 weeks, let adopters know that while you're doing all you can to help them thrive, sometimes there is no quarantee.
- Don't get disappointed if it doesn't work out. People change their minds and it's 100% okay. You'll find someone else.
- Have an open mind. Animal lovers come in all shapes, colors, and sizes. Avoid using a super-long adoption form just start a conversation and learn more about the potential family. Being open means they will reach out to you with future questions.
- Remember, you can't keep them all and that is okay. Your role as a foster parent is to help them along in their journey of life. Do not let others guilt you by saying, "I could never let them go." This doesn't make you weak it makes you strong! There will always be kittens in need and if you kept them all, you couldn't continue to foster. So don't listen to those well-intended but misdirected comments. You are Kitten Army strong!
