If you feel that you are out of options and finding a new home is best for your pet, we encourage you to try re-homing your pet on your own rather than surrendering to JHS or another shelter. We're here to help! You can list your pet at no cost on the Community Pet Page of our website. It will be seen by the more than 30,000 visitors who come to our website each month.

To post your pet on our website, you will need to create a profile on <a href="rehome.adoptapet.com">rehome.adoptapet.com</a>. Through our unique partnership, all pets looking for new homes "by owner" will be featured on the JHS website.

The Rehome website can help you handle the adoption process, provide access to safe meeting places at Petco stores and the adoption fee you charge can be donated to JHS so we can continue to help others.

If you have attempted to rehome your pet and have been unsuccessful or feel stuck about what to do next, please contact our <a href="Pet Help Center">Pet Help Center</a> to discuss your choices. Pets are admitted by appointment only.

## Missing Pets: Lost and Found Help

#### Lost / found cats or kittens

Community cats, sometimes called free-roaming or feral cats, are common in our and every city. Community cats in Jacksonville are spayed/neutered, vaccinated, and returned to the location they were found. This program is called "Trap Neuter Vaccinate Return" or "TNVR" for short.

Look for a missing tip on an outdoor cat's ear. The "ear tip" is a universal sign that a cat is altered and vaccinated and can be left where you found it.

#### You found kittens. Now what?



#### STOP. Look for the mother cat.

A kitten's best chance at survival is to stay with its mother. She is likely nearby, getting food or waiting for you to leave so she can return to the nest.

#### **DO NOT KITNAP KITTENS!**



#### Mom returns!

You can support the family by providing food and shelter, and most importantly, getting them spayed/neutered when the kittens are eight weeks old.



#### No mom?

If you step in, you are assuming the responsibility of providing care to raise the kittens. Check with local organizations and your veterinarian for support and options.



#### Emergency?

If the kittens or mother cat are experiencing a true medical emergency, take them to a local veterinarian. You can also try animal shelters and rescues. Remember - kittens on their own are not in an emergency.



#### Stop the Cycle!

The best way to help cats is to have them spayed or neutered to stop the cycle of kitten births. Look for local Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return options and stop cats from reproducing by taking the steps to get them altered.

#### Lost / found dogs or other pets

Is your pet missing, or did you find a lost pet in Jacksonville? Many people think that as soon as you find a pet it should be taken to a shelter, but we encourage you to look for the owners. By keeping the pet while looking the owners yourself, you are leaving a kennel open for a dog or cat in need. You are saving lives! If you've lost your pet, there are many resources available to help you reunite with them.

Here are a few tips...

## Walk the Animal Around the Neighborhood

A few good things can happen from this. Someone may be actively searching for their animal or found yours, and you could run into them. Or, you may pass someone who knows who the found pet belongs to. The pet may even lead you to his own home. Most animals are found a block or less from their home.

#### 2. Check for a Microchip

A microchip is something implanted in a pet's skin which links you to owner information when scanned. Most vet offices and shelters have microchip scanners and are happy to check for you. Microchips can help reunite pets with their owners, whether they are lost or found!

#### 3. Notify Local Shelters

Animal Care and Protective Services is the City of Jacksonville's animal shelter. Call 904.630.CITY (2489) or use the MyJax App to report your lost or found pet. Then, you can notify JHS using the online forms found on the Lost & Found page of our website.

#### 4. Use Petco Love Lost

Petco Love Lost is a national database and free reunification tool to make finding lost pets quicker and easier. Uploaded photos of a missing dog or cat are immediately scanned to determine whether the lost pet is at a participating shelter or with a neighbor in the community. Register with Petco Love Lost at <a href="Iost.petcolove.org">Iost.petcolove.org</a>.


#### 5. Use Social Media

Everyone is on Facebook these days - use that to your advantage! Post a picture of the lost or found pet with the area he or she was lost or found in and include your contact information. Ask people to share it.

#### 6. Distribute Flyers

Post flyers around where the pet was lost or found. The bigger and brighter, the better! People are much more likely to notice fluorescent colors. You can put your flyer in a sheet protector and tape it to a large piece of fluorescent poster board to make it stand out.
